### JUNIOR GIRLS LEAGUE TAG

On Thursday 1 August students from Cootamundra High School participated in a League Tag competition in Wagga with 11 other schools from the area. The girls were placed in a pool with two other teams. The team was coached by Ellisha Large and

Mikayla Large who trained with them and organised the team—even running water!

In the first game the girls came up against a strong Mater Dei team who were able to keep Coota High scoreless, running away 30—0 winners.

The second game saw the girls play Koorinal High. This time the game was dominated by Coota who won 34—0. Janine Lambert showed great skills when she ran away from the defenders to score an 80m try. Alecia Slavin, Shannon Caldwell and Zoe Armstrong all scored 2 tries each while Natasha Maher was able to convert 3 with her impressive drop kicking skills.

### MENTAL HEALTH PRESENTATION

Mental illness is one of the most pressing issues for young people. 45% of Australians will have a mental illness in their lifetime—that's nearly every second one of us. Research has shown that up to 75% of all mental health issues first begin before the age of 24. The most common mental illnesses include anxiety, substance use disorders and mood disorders, that is, depression and bipolar disorder. Mood disorders is the focus of the *Insight presentation*.

*Insight* is a presentation for secondary school students. It shows a series of engaging and humorous images that convey complex concepts to students and teachers. Illustrated by Matthew Johnstone, topics include: challenges facing young people, mood disorder facts and statistics, at-risk personality types, coping strategies, fears of seeking help, finding the right help – who/what/how, benefits of good therapy, family and school support, resilience and how it can be built.

Cootamundra High School plans to host the *Insight* presentation for all students. Local mental health service providers Mission Australia, Headspace and Community Mental Health will present.

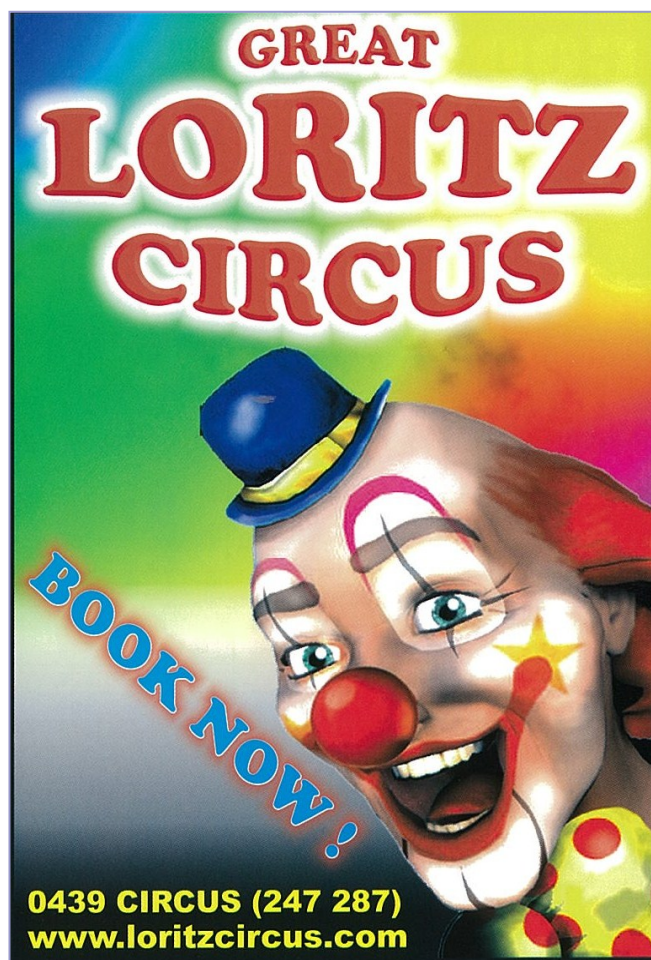
### JUNIOR REBOUND SOCCER
