The business end of the year has commenced for many students, namely Year 12 who are already through the first week of the HSC examination period.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Year 12 and their parents are reminded that most university and TAFE scholarships are now open and it is highly recommended that you download the application forms and make a start. Scholarships are often unfilled and are not always targeted towards high academic achievements, and for that reason it is certainly worth applying.

UNIVERSITY ACCOMMODATION

Students and parents are reminded that accommodation needs to be arranged for most universities sooner rather than later. Some will require a deposit, however many are refundable so check with your respective institutions on this.

SCHOOLS RECOMMENDATION SCHEME (EARLY ENTRY)

A total of 14 students have applied for this and will receive notification of their eligibility from mid to late November from the respective universities. It is important to ensure that preferences are then ordered correctly on the UAC site by midnight on Tuesday, 2 December.

UOW DISCOVERY DAY

Expressions of interest are being sought for current Year 11 students interested in attending the annual Discovery Day in Wollongong early in 2015. It is an overnight stay with a minimal cost. All students considering university as an option are strongly recommended to attend and should register their interest with Mrs Alderman.
