HONEYWELL ENGINEERING

On the 10th-15th of December I was invited to explore different pathways of engineering. There were many universities we visited such as UTS, university of Wollongong and Macquarie University. We also got a tour through Port Kembla steelworks, cochlear and RAAF base.

All of the locations we visited provided me with an insight to what sort of path ways I may go with to get into engineering. At each location the university students and other mentors provided us with practical activities and lectures on their area and workplace.

Cochlear is one of the locations that we visited. Some of the workers gave us a tour of the workplace and explained how each part of the work shop ran and how they constructed the cochlear implant.

The workers of cochlear first explained how it worked in three stations. The workers showed us how the 22 electrodes picked up a different pitch of sound. The noise that it projects into the ear is a bit robotic because it only projects 22 pitches where a normal person can hear hundreds of pitches.




The workers showed us the labs that the workers worked in and created the implant. It was broken down into sections of the production of the implant. Some people had the job as I had in the picture below which was to stand up tiny rings in a small tem-



plate. The rings were so small that you had to use a microscope and tweezers to stand them up because otherwise you couldn't do it. The purpose of doing this task is that the wires are meant to go through the rings and connect to the other half of the implant.

Another place we went to was Port Kembla Steel-



works. We got a tour on how the steel and explained from start to finish on how the steel was made. The whole plant covers 8 square kilometres and has 90



kilometres of railway tracks throughout the plant this is because it's the only way of transport. Our tour started where the metal was melted in a massive ladle that holds 275 tonnes of molten metal. It is then poured into 12m slabs. Then they slowly thin it out by roller and goes back and until the metal from 230mm to down to 3mm. The length of the slab is 90m once it is flattened out. Once it reached 90m it travelled along a conveyor belt and would reach the end and coil up be marked and ready to be transported on trains.

LIBRARY NEWS


Welcome back!



SWIMMING CARNIVAL PHOTOS



Seven new school zone traffic offences

To help schools keep the school zone safer for all pedestrians and drivers there are seven new traffic infringements with new fines.

None of the seven offences attract demerit points when committed elsewhere on the road but in a school zone they each come with two points.

The changes are:

1. Stopping in intersection - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
2. Stop within 20m of intersection (traffic lights) - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
3. Stop within 10m of intersection (no traffic lights) - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
4. Stop near bicycle crossing lights - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
5. Obstruct access to ramp/path/passageway - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$330 and 2 demerit points.
6. Not parallel park in the direction of travel - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.
7. Parallel park close to dividing line - Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.

NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

Dear Parents,

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2018 the following vaccines will be offered:

YEARS	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine	2-doses at least 6 months apart
	Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine	Single dose
Years 10-11	Meningococcal ACWY vaccine	Single dose

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- **read** all the information provided
- **complete** the consent form, including **signing** their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- **return the completed consent form** to the front office at school **by TUESDAY 13th February 2018**
- **ensure** that your **child eats breakfast** on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that students who commence HPV vaccination in school clinics in Year 7 but do not complete the course during the school year may be offered catch-up doses at school in Year 8. Students who have any HPV doses at their GP will be advised to complete the course with their GP.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or letting Mrs Hanekom know. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation.

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic. Parents/guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.
